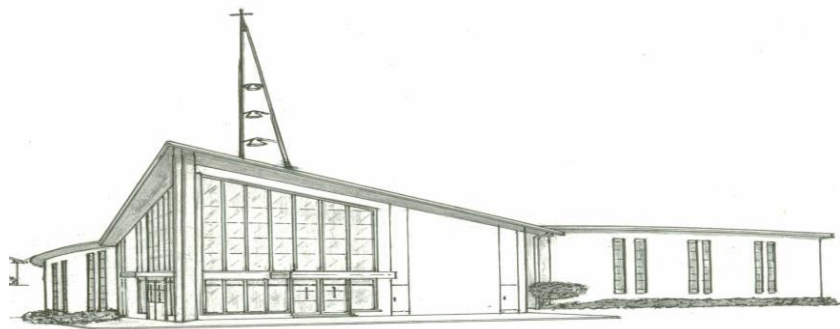

#### **Part II: Are You Ready? - God is Being Born Again**

The year ending declared by Pope Francis an Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy, has added urgency to internal Church Reform, Pastoral Outreach and the Prophetic Cry for Economic and Environmental change as a matter of survival of the planet and the common good of humanity. The symbolic doors of mercy, unsealed and opened in Rome, and in dioceses and parishes around the globe, have urged conversion and renewal while there is still time.

Even though the Holy Year of Mercy formally ended November 20th, the essential practice of Mercy and Forgiveness continue because they are the essence of the Gospel and every Disciple's way of life. The divine face of Mercy, revealed by Jesus, comes to stay in our lives, entering through the door of our hearts, only to lead us out again to share God's unconditional love.

Francis reminds us that experience, encounter and surprise are more important than any Orthodoxy of ideas and rules. Isn't this what faithful Joseph learned when the dream of Angels over-rode the logic of the law? He awoke, unafraid, to embrace Mary and her child. Isn't this how God always enters our lives? Don't be afraid to live passionately; to go to the margins where strangers become friends and lost sheep wait to be carried home again.

If God is in all things, even our sufferings and losses uncover new paths, unexpected blessings and growing edges, we would never have known without crisis.

#### Part III:

The voices of Matthew and Isaiah take up the story of salvation, warning us to be awake and alert lest the coming of God overtake us like a thief in the night. To resist needed change is to risk an ax to the root of the tree, a winnowing fan that separates the wheat from the chaff. A door has opened. The poor hear good news; every bodily sense is awake and attuned to the mystery of grace cursing through the cosmos like a river that make a desert bloom.

We should not be surprised that our liturgical language and Church rituals also describe the critical challenges occurring in our society and world. Isn't this what God looks like? Data becomes visible in the shifting patterns of population in our cities, as coded ideologies compete on social media, and the ethnic and cultural fabric of our communities stresses at the seams and strains to be named in our schools, workplaces, and in the public square. Refugees and immigrants arrive like Magi bearing gifts from the four corners of the world that, if we put down our fears, will renew our tired ideals.

The world is being reborn, generation by generation and God's creation shows in trimesters of conception and gestation, our shared future dancing in the womb eager to be born. Will we be ready?

Ready or not, God is being born again in our time, in the sweeping patterns of inevitable change, and in the intimate hopes we hold as close as a newborn child.

MEMORIAL OF BASIL THE GREAT AND GREGORY NAZIANZEN, BISHOPS AND DOCTORS OF THE CHURCH

### Meet the Cappodocians

How's this for a circle of family and friends: One of the brothers of the fourth-century bishop and theologian Saint Basil was Bishop Gregory of Nyssa. Counted also as saints are Basil's grandmother, father, another of his brothers, and his sister. His good friend was Bishop Gregory of Nazianzus, also remembered today. Basil and his illustrious group came from the Greek region of Cappodocia, which had a tough reputation. They liked to tell the story that when a snake bit a Cappodocian, the snake died. Follow these holy Cappodocians and put some bite in your faith.

MEMORIAL OF THE MOST HOLY NAME OF JESUS

### What's in a name? Everything

Do you know the name of the person who delivers your mail? What about the manager of your grocery store or the CEO of your power company? Our automated, electronic, virtual world makes it nearly impossible to have personal contact with people who perform important services for us each day. Yet, amazingly, we know the name of our Divine Savior, whom we are encouraged to call directly for help. We honor the holy name of Jesus because God was revealed to us personally through Jesus, who invited us to share in his life and perform works of love and mercy in his name. What will you do today in the name of Jesus?

MEMORIAL OF ELIZABETH ANN SETON, RELIGIOUS

### A woman for all seasons

Elizabeth Seton (1774-1821) became a Catholic at 30, after the death of her husband and over the protests of her Episcopalian family and friends. She had always been active in the support of poor widows and their children, enough to merit her the nickname "the Protestant Sister of Charity." Estranged from her relatives, the now-Catholic Elizabeth banded together with like-minded women to become the Daughters of Charity of St. Joseph. The sisters established orphanages and hospitals, but their commitment to the parochial school system became their renown.

##### MEMORIAL OF JOHN NEUMANN, BISHOP

###### **A penny's worth of good**

**Children resist accompanying their parents to places that are no fun for them: the bank, grocery store, or gas station. This list may also include church. Young John Neumann was no different. He wouldn't attend Mass, the rosary, or Stations with his mother unless she sweetened the deal with a penny. Mrs. Neumann got a good return on those pennies! So did the American church. The future bishop would walk miles to deliver sacraments to a single child—who may have felt similarly uninspired without a penny's worth of investment. Share your faith with a child.**

#### FRIDAY, JANUARY 6

##### MEMORIAL OF ANDRÉ BESSETTE, RELIGIOUS

###### **Knock and the door will open**

**Nearly rejected by his order, the sickly Blessed André Bessette (1845-1937) was finally allowed to become a religious brother. His superiors figured that "if he can't work, at least he'll be good at praying." It turns out he was good at both. Assigned to be the porter—a kind of greeter and errand boy—at Notre Dame college in Montreal, he spent his days listening to the**

**concerns of all who arrived at his door, especially the poor and afflicted. He lived to be 91 and became known for his healings and his devotion to Saint Joseph. Today, pray in his memory to Saint Joseph for your needs or the needs of a loved one.**

#### SATURDAY, JANUARY 7

##### MEMORIAL OF RAYMOND OF PEÑAFORT, PRIEST

###### **Serve when called**

**After his surprise election to be president of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in 2010, Archbishop Timothy Dolan of New York quipped, "The posture of the bishops, of course, is you don't really run for office, you run from it." Saint Raymond of Peñafort (1175-1275) would have agreed. A scholar and lawyer, he entered the Dominican order at the relatively late age of 47 and did his best to avoid getting promoted. Sickness kept him from being named an archbishop, but he couldn't get out of becoming general of the Dominicans. There are times you may be asked to step up—like serving on a committee or caring for a relative. Remember that even reluctant leaders can lead!**
